

Works Cited and Parenthetical Reference

Works Cited: This is the last page of your research paper. It is a list of the **works** you reference in the body of your paper.

Reminders for formatting your works cited page:

Header – this is your last name and page number and goes in the top right corner (only if directed by the teacher)

Title – centred, not bolded or underlined

Double space the entire page

Indent the second and following lines of each citation (Use "Hanging Indent" if using Word Online)

Alphabetical Order

Font: Times New Roman 12pt, Arial 12pt

Margins

Parenthetical Referencing: When you include quotations in your assignment, you must have a proper parenthetical reference for the source you copied the information from. The parenthetical reference is the first most important word of the MLA citation. This may be the author's last name, if there is an author, **OR** it may be the first word(s) of the title. Also, if it a print source, then you must include the page number in the brackets as well. Always refer to your works cited in order to decide what will go in the parenthetical reference (brackets).

Below are examples of citations with different sources and their parenthetical references:

1) Internet Citation with an author:

Smith, John. "The Global Health Observatory." *World Health Organization*, 2020, www.who.int/about.

Parenthetical Reference: "The way our society treats the environment has a great impact on the future of our world" (Smith). ***Author's last name***

2) Internet Citation without an author:

"The Global Health Observatory." *World Health Organization*, 2020, www.who.int/about.

Parenthetical Reference: "The way our society treats the environment has a great impact on the future of our world" ("The Global"). ***First important words in title***

3) Print/Book Source:

Ghent, James. *Making a New Prediction*. Penguin, 2019.

Parenthetical Reference: (Ghent 78)

4) Online Magazine Article:

Bond, Steven. "The Effects of Climate Change." *The Earth Magazine*, 3 Jan. 2020,

www.theearthmagazine.com/environment/climate-change.

Parenthetical Reference: (Bond)

5) Online Digital Image:

"Waterfalls in Ontario." *Beautiful Scenery Around the World*, 7 Sept. 2019,

If there are more than one quote from this same Bible source, you would only need to put the book, chapter and verse for the other parenthetical references.
